

FROM THE RECTOR

Dear friends,

It is the in-between times. As I write this, Christmas is only a few weeks in the past and within a month we will be in Lent. It was heartening to see that many churches throughout Scotland saw a great increase in numbers at Christmas services and we experienced the same. Our church had over 250 people at our services and large numbers at the Indian Orthodox Vigil between Christingle and Midnight Mass. We also had the joy of our Candlelit Community Carol Service and joining with the other local churches for Carols in the Pub. Significant sums of money were raised for our two Christmas charities, Jeeps for Peace (Ukraine) and the St Salvador's Food Bank.

In the last magazine I said that our vision is simply that of Jesus, 'love God and love your neighbour as yourself', therefore it was really good to see so many of our neighbours coming through our doors (and joining us in the pub) to worship God. I was particularly pleased to see so many of the families who have been to Toddler Church and our Children's Concerts at the Christmas Eve family services. Their children felt so at home in God's House that they were happy to come up and arrange knitted sheep in our crib. I was also really pleased to see so many people at the Christmas Market & Lights Switch On at Holy Cross at the start of Advent. Over 6,200 people came into our grounds and many visited our church. Thanks to Izzy and David Townhill, and Phil Coad of Davidson's Mains Parish Church for organising music in church and on the stage. This is all a great sign that we are reconnecting with our local community and the Lights Committee did some great work tidying up our grounds.

I would like to thank Izzy for all she is doing with our children and families ministry. She will stop leading Toddler Church at Easter as our baby is due in late May and she will not return to children's ministry until next year. While she is away David Townhill and I will run the children's concerts and Alan Kirkpatrick will be our sole safeguarding convener.

We welcome our new Vestry members, David Townhill and Peggy Farrar, and also those who have taken on new roles: Alan Kirkpatrick as Lay Representative and Sally Mair as alternate Lay Representative. Vestry members are the charity trustees of the congregation and, chaired by the Rector, are responsible for the practical side of our life. They also support the Rector in his spiritual and pastoral leadership. The Lay Representative represents Holy Cross at the Diocesan Synod, which is like the parliament of

our diocese of Edinburgh. Nicole Elvin is retiring as Vestry Secretary at the end of this year and anyone who is interested in taking on this role should speak to her or to me. As a community we depend on the generosity of our members.

This year Lent falls on St Valentine's Day. Love among the ashes. This coincidence is great material for sermons but love should drive our Lenten observance. Lent is like a spiritual spring clean, we take things on and give things up to help us be closer to God. It starts on Ash Wednesday when we have two Eucharists with the reception of ashes. We are planning Lent study groups and we hope to establish a permanent contemplative/silent prayer meeting. More details of these are on page 5.

The first Sunday of Lent is the fourth anniversary of my institution as Rector. So much good has happened in those four years, which started with a pandemic and a freezing church because the boiler was condemned. Izzy and I are grateful for the warm welcome we received (we remember Esme Randall turning up on our doorstep with a tasty fish pie) and are really happy here. Thank you for your continuing love and support. Let us pray for each other and build up the Kingdom of God.

TREASURER'S REPORT

It seems like only last week that I was toiling over the Annual Report and Accounts for the AGM, but now as I write it is January and we are four months into the new financial year. Last year, we restored our reserves to their target level, and I set a conservative budget at the AGM aiming to consolidate that position.

After the first four months, I am pleased to say we are currently ahead of our budget. Congregational giving is on target, boosted by donations totalling £3,075 for the Holy Cross Gift Day (exceeding last year's total), and special collections at the various Advent and Christmas services. Donations have also been coming in for the St Salvador's Food Bank, Jeeps for Peace, Ross's Ordination gift, the magazine, the Lectionary, the Congregational Lunch and church flowers, so you can see the Treasurer has been kept on his toes. We received a grant of £6,672 from the SEC Buildings Grant fund for work already paid for on the Rectory pointing, which has significantly boosted our bank balance. Repairs and maintenance costs have been mercifully low todate this year (Sept – Dec). Hall rents have, as predicted, been lower than last year following the departure of the Reindeer Playgroup and the After School Club but we had allowed for that in the budget. It's good to be able to report such a positive start, long may it continue!



WORLD DAY OF PRAYER

Friday 1st March 2024 2 p.m. at Cramond Kirk All Welcome!

'I beg you to bear with one another in love' Written by Christian women of Palestine The land where Christianity was born!

Every year on (or near) the first Friday in March, Christians around the world, of all denominations and church groups and all ages, gather in small groups and large congregations using the same basic form of worship, written by women of a different country each year on a theme chosen by the World Day of Prayer International Committee.

A group of ecumenical Palestinian Christian women have worked collectively the last four years to pray and reflect on the theme, and they invite us to join them as they pray:

- For peace
- For justice
- For love and unity

'Lord, teach us to pray'

Let us praise God who brings us together to worship in love and unity. 'I beg you to bear with one another in love.' (Ephesians 4.1-7)

A VISIT TO SOUTH AFRICA WITH CHRISTIAN AID

The Zulu word *uhambo* means journey. It was the title of the trip which I took in late October to South Africa with Christian Aid. The purpose of our journey was to meet some of the programmes which Christian Aid support and to reflect on what these encounters might say to us. Our principal conversation partners were Church Land Programme (CLP), an organisation that was founded in the wake of apartheid to stand in solidarity with the landless poor. Using the method of see–judge–act and guided by the maxim that 'we make the road by walking', CLP invited us to journey over ten days into the realities of contemporary South Africa.

The hard truth is that South Africa is a country that teeters on the edge of societal collapse. Power outages are a frequent occurrence, violent crime is

endemic, and communities find themselves increasingly divided. Where the African National Congress (ANC) – the party of Nelson Mandela – once represented a new future for South Africa, for an increasing number of people they now exemplify incompetence and cronyism. As one community organiser described the situation: 'for many, it feels like after apartheid, the players changed but the game remained the same'. Here, then, is a cautionary tale about the dangers of political power: the radicals became the institution.

Our time in South Africa was divided between Durban and Pietermaritzburg, in the province of KwaZulu-Natal. Here we met with folk from several organisations who are seeking to bring about change. These included: Abahlali baseMjondolo, the largest movement of the organised poor in post-apartheid South Africa; the South Durban Community Environmental Alliance (SDCEA), a non-governmental coalition who struggle for higher environmental standards; and the Ujamaa Centre, who have developed an internationally renowned method of contextual Bible study. Each day ended with a period of reflection, during which we grappled with the stories and realities that we had encountered.

From Abahlali, we heard a voice of protest against the deep inequalities in South Africa, the principal demands of their movement being land, housing, and dignity – demands that have led to more than 20 of their leaders being assassinated. We also witnessed what the housing conditions are like for those who live in informal settlements. Yet, the comrades of Abahlali are not to be pitied but rather respected as an embodiment of dignified resistance. On our Toxic Tour with SDCEA, we learnt how multinational corporations have stripped South Africa of its natural resources. The lasting impact is one of environmental degradation. In conversation with Ujamaa, we considered how social questions might be brought into dialogue with scripture in a process-driven method of Bible study. The question, then, is not simply what scripture says about a topic but how the process of considering what scripture says in light of contextual challenges might lead us to act in new ways.

During our time in South Africa, we came to see the impact of a dream delayed. For many the promises of a rainbow nation has failed to materialise. However, through the people we met and the conversations we shared on our journey we were able to catch glimpses of the Spirit moving in the struggles for a new reality.
