FROM THE RECTOR

Dear friends.

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! The poet T.S. Eliot says that 'April is the cruellest month', but for us this year April is the month of Easter, a feast which is the heart of our faith. As I write this all sorts of preparations are in hand and it is great that we will be sharing some of our services with St Salvador's, Stenhouse and St David's, Pilton, and sharing our church with the Syrian Orthodox congregations who worship here. Christ died alone and was alone in the tomb, but he rose from the dead to raise up the whole Church together with him to heaven. We live only if we live together.

There is a beautiful ancient sermon from the first centuries of Christianity that expresses this so well. Christ went down into the depths of Hades to rescue Adam and all kept in darkness in order to raise them to live together with him (see page 4).

I'm pleased to say that some of the adults at Toddler Church have arranged to keep it running while Izzy, our Children's Minister, is on maternity leave. It is a tribute to what Izzy, Pauline, Brenda and others have built up here that it has taken on a life of its own. Our children's ministry has enabled Holy Cross to engage with the local community in many new ways and we look forward to the baptism of Klara later this month as another of the signs of spring and Easter joy.

May you and your families and friends experience that joy in your lives.

'Something strange is happening – there is a great silence on earth today, a great silence and stillness. The whole earth keeps silence because the King is asleep. The earth trembled and is still because God has fallen asleep in the flesh and he has raised up all who have slept ever since the world began. God has died in the flesh and hell trembles with fear.

He has gone to search for our first parent, as for a lost sheep. Greatly desiring to visit those who live in darkness and in the shadow of death, he has gone to free from sorrow the captives Adam and Eve, he who is both God and the son of Eve. The Lord approached them bearing the cross, the weapon that had won him the victory. At the sight of him, Adam, the first man he had created, struck his breast in terror and cried out to everyone: "My Lord be with you all." Christ answered him: "And with your spirit." He took him by the hand and raised him up, saying:

"Awake, O sleeper, and rise from the dead, and Christ will give you light.

"I am your God, who for your sake have become your son. Out of love for you and for your descendants I now by my own authority command all who are held in bondage to come forth, all who are in darkness to be enlightened, all who are sleeping to arise.

"I order you, O sleeper, to awake. I did not create you to be held a prisoner in hell. Rise from the dead, for I am the life of the dead. Rise up, work of my hands, you who were created in my image. Rise, let us leave this place, for you are in me and I am in you; together we form only one person and we cannot be separated. For your sake I, your God, became your son; I, the Lord, took the form of a slave; I, whose home is above the heavens, descended to the earth and beneath the earth."

ST SALVADOR'S FOOD BANK

Thanks to all who donate food or money to the St Salvador's Food Initiative. We now have a large black box to collect donations, with thanks to Catherine Douglas. Numbers are still high at the food bank and the need continues.



In addition to food we also serve tea and coffee and members of the team chat with the visitors – a great community has been built up and people who have used the food bank have come back to help or to worship at St Salvador's. For those of us at Holy Cross, this is an important link between our two congregations and a good way to help people in need.

Items particularly needed are rice, cooking oil, tins of tuna, packs of sweet biscuits and those cheap instant noodle packs. Other tinned and packet food is welcome too. They also need nappies – at present sizes 3 to 6 are most in demand – and other hygiene items.
