

FROM THE RECTOR

Dear friends,

It is interesting that Christianity has returned to the centre of Scottish politics again during the recent upheavals in the Scottish Parliament. The new Deputy First Minister, Kate Forbes has never made a secret of her faith, saying in an interview, 'I believe in the person of Jesus Christ, I believe that he died for me, he saved me. And that my calling is to serve and to love him and to serve and love my neighbours with all my heart and soul and mind and strength'. An attack on her faith by members of the Scottish Greens then provoked a statement of Christian faith, in the Holyrood Chamber, from the new First Minister, John Swinney: 'I believe that nothing can separate us from the love of God, that is the foundation of my faith'. Ironically, the Scottish Greens MSP who provoked this, Ross Greer, is also a Christian.

So, despite the attacks on Kate Forbes and the aggressive secularism of some in Scottish politics, we can still 'do God' in public life... and Christians still disagree with each other! Our faith should influence our politics, and the best response to the sort of person who says religion and politics shouldn't mix is Bishop Desmond Tutu's: 'they must have a different Bible to mine'.

At Holy Cross our mission is that of Jesus: 'love God and love your neighbour'. To love our neighbours we need to know them, and I have been pleased recently to hear from a number of local people that 'your church is a community church', 'I often see the doors of your church open' or 'your church is involved in the community'. A church that is not involved in its community is a dead church and that is not God's will.

We are not a large congregation, so we can only sustain this community involvement by forming partnerships. It was lovely to see Holy Cross full of families for the May Children's Concert which was enabled by our partnership with Live Music Now Scotland. Details of further concerts are found on page 5; if you have any under-5s in your family, bring them along! Close links with the Davidson's Mains Christmas Lights Committee and Scouts – whose trailer is kept in our grounds – have been fruitful, not least in good work tidying our grounds. Churches and pubs naturally go together (at least in my mind) and I was glad to present a certificate to Ye Olde Inn last month to thank them for their collection in connection with the Christmas carols in the pub for Jeeps for Peace for Ukraine. There are also our three Indian Orthodox congregations who meet on Saturdays to celebrate Mass in our church. We have welcomed them and they have given a great welcome to our clergy families, I hope we can build on this relationship.

As we can only flourish by building partnerships, so we need money to exist. Colin noted in the last magazine that as costs go up, we should, if possible, increase our giving to Holy Cross (otherwise in real terms our giving is going down). These financial donations are part of our Christian discipleship and it is good to regularly review them – if your income goes down you may wish to reduce your giving and vice versa. Our Orthodox congregations contribute for the use of our church and hall, and they made some extra donations this Easter. We have also made an arrangement with a company moving to Davidson's Mains for them to hire three spaces in our car park during the working day (not evenings or weekends). You will see the parking bays being marked out in the coming weeks. You are generous, we have seen a remarkable increase in giving over the past two years, but still we do not give enough to cover annual costs and so we need extra income streams.

Another form of partnership is with local churches. We have our link with St Salvador's and generously support its food bank; it is a great privilege to help out there each month and celebrate the Eucharist with the large congregation that meets before the food is given out. I have even met members of our Orthodox congregations there, at the Mass or giving or receiving food. I also meet regularly with local clergy and look forward to welcoming the Revd Julia Cato, new Minister of Edinburgh Northwest Kirk, formed through the union of Cramond Kirk and Old Kirk & Muirhouse (now Pennywell Kirk). Cramond was once Episcopalian so is part of our history, reminding us of the most important partnership, in God and beyond time.

In Jesus God became man and so took the human race into partnership (if you think about it, this is amazing). In the Church that Jesus founded we are united with other Christians through time, space and beyond. St Columba of Iona is in Holy Cross in our East Window and the icon by the door. He is also the patron of the ancient parish of Cramond in which our church stands. Cramond was a 'detached parish' of the diocese of Dunkeld, which is where the monks of Iona moved with the relics of Columba at the time of the Viking raids. St Columba's Isle of Inchcolm in the Forth, 'the Iona of the East', was also part of that diocese (as were Dalgety and Aberdour). It is probable that monks from Iona and Dunkeld crossed the Forth at Cramond on their way to Lindisfarne and walked along the Roman Road that passes Holy Cross. Columba is thus our secondary patron and we will keep his feast day on Sunday 9th June, think together about what he still says to us and sing some hymns by or about him. Why not come and join us then?

But God has promised strength for the day Rest for the labour, light for the way, Grace for the trials, help from above, Unfailing kindness, undying love.


God has not promised we shall not know Toil and temptation, trouble and woe. He has not told us we shall not bear Many a burden, many a care.
