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FROM THE RECTOR

Dear friends,

May is Mary's month. Gerard Manley Hopkins writes about it in the poem on page 4. There is something about spring that put Christians of past times in mind of Mary and her giving birth to new life for the world in Jesus. May is also the month when a new baby is due at the Rectory and Izzy and I thank you for your continuing love and support. I will be taking the statutory two months' paternity leave from the birth and during that time Fr Ross will be looking after Holy Cross and St Salvador's and, as usual, our church wardens will also be around to help. Waiting for a baby to be born and wondering what they will be like reminds us that we are not in charge and reminds us to pray and trust in the Lord.

When Bess was born in Cornwall a wonderful parishioner, the late Major Hugo White, sent me a card saying 'procreative growth is the best form of Church growth, Vicar'. Here at Holy Cross there are certainly many things going on which could contribute to other types of growth in our community. One is our new silent prayer group on Wednesday evenings, another is the Children's Concerts and another is the Fellowship Meal at the end of the month. Prayer, reaching out to the community and eating together all build up the Kingdom of God.

May Magnificat, like others of Hopkins' poems, celebrates nature and our faith together. They belong together as our God is both Creator and Redeemer. Mankind has not been good in caring for the world God gave us and all the evidence shows that we are living in a climate crisis with record temperatures, rising sea levels and a great increase in what climatologists coyly call 'extreme weather events'. In Mali temperatures have soared to almost 50 degrees in the past weeks and damage to agriculture in Africa, together with war, is fuelling poverty and migration. The response to this crisis is sometimes tinged with despair and an un-Christian hostility to humanity, but our faith can bring hope and inspire action.

We have a responsibility to care for creation and the Vestry has decided to support the creation of a Holy Cross Eco Group and to encourage us to work towards being an eco-congregation. This follows the Scottish Episcopal Church's commitment to turn away from fossil fuels and work towards 'net zero'. We will work out a way of doing this that is appropriate for Holy Cross, and it is encouraging to see that we are already part of the way there, for example in the use of our grounds. Alison Proud, who comes to our 9 a.m, Eucharist, writes more about this on page 10. May is Mary's month and is a season of new life. The earth itself is often called a mother. Our faith is not just something we think about on Sundays, it should transform our families and the world around us,

People from across Edinburgh Diocese are coming together at St Mary's Cathedral on Saturday 11th May for our 2024 Big Day. This year, our theme is 'Let Us Pray!' and aspires to have something for everyone to grow in their prayer life.

Attendees can arrive from 10.15 a.m. to enjoy some refreshments and fellowship, with worship starting at 10.45 a.m. There will be group sessions in the morning and afternoon, where people can explore different types of prayer or prayerful topics, including (but not limited to) Lectio Divina, imaginative prayer, the Jesus Prayer, Examen, prayer and movement, bible journalling, and the Lord's Prayer in British Sign Language. TREASURER'S REPORT

As I write this in the middle of April, we are seven months into our 2023/24 financial year. At the beginning of the financial year (September), we set a budget for us to break even and therefore maintain our reserves. Our position at the end of March however was worse than budgeted for.

Our expenditure to date is £47,487 which is £197 less than we budgeted, however our income to date is £43,959 which is £3,757 below what we budgeted for. As a result we are £3,560 below our planned budget. Within these totals, though, there are inevitably pluses and minuses where either I have estimated wrongly in our budget or where income or expenditure isn't evenly spread throughout the year.

Below I have picked out items where there are major variations from budget. **Income**

Congregational giving is £723 below estimate. Many people pay monthly by Standing Order for which I am very grateful. Apart from providing a regular and predictable income it saves effort and anxiety for Welcomers, who no longer need to count and record the weekly cash/cheque collection and saves me the effort of weekly trips to the bank and time-consuming waits for a teller. If you still pay regularly by cash donation, it would be very helpful if you would consider setting up a regular Standing Order. (Please speak to me if I can help you with this. I do realise that for some people this is not possible.) Many of you who already pay by Standing Order have increased your giving over the last year or two. If you have been contributing the same monthly amount for a long time, I would ask you to consider if you can afford to increase it. Even a small increase is welcome; as Scots reputedly say, 'mony a mickle maks a muckle'.

Gift Aid was £5,950 below budget at the end of March, but this was not a cause for concern. I normally claim Gift Aid from HMRC twice annually and I had just completed our first claim for 2023/24, so, in April we received just under £9,000 from our friends in HMRC. (Not many people consider HMRC to be their friend!)

Hall rents are £1,279 below estimate. We have not yet found replacements for the Reindeer Playgroup and Oscar's After School Club, though we are hopeful that we will have a new after school club starting after the school summer holidays. We had predicted this shortfall in rent income in the budget we set. However, our Brownie and Guide groups have both fallen significantly behind with their rental payments. The rental these groups pay is heavily subsidised – we charge them around half of the commercial rate – but there is still a considerable shortfall due to us. I have raised this with those concerned and hopefully we will receive payment soon. On the positive side we now have three Indian Syriac congregations using the church and hall and although they pay relatively modest contributions, it is another source of regular income.

We did budget for a small amount of fundraising income but have not held any specific events to date. Could anyone rise to the challenge? We need some innovative thinking.

On a positive note, grants, insurance claims and VAT recovery are currently double the amount budgeted for, mainly due to grants received for the hall, church, and the Rectory rewiring. The bills were paid in 2022/23 but the grants were not received until 2023/24. We don't expect any further grants in the current financial year so we will probably end the year matching our budget.

Expenditure

Repairs and maintenance costs are thankfully \pounds 3,056 below budget but this type of expenditure doesn't come evenly throughout the year and expenses can arise at any time.

Heat and light costs are $\pounds 2,476$ over budget and this is a major cause for concern to me. We were moved onto a new gas contract in mid-December which is more than twice as expensive as the previous contract. I am trying to find a way to cancel this contract and get a cheaper deal, but our broker (Bionic) and our Gas provider (British Gas Lite) are proving difficult to contact and reluctant to consider any options, so I fear we may be locked into this contract for two years. Fortunately, our gas usage over the summer months is dramatically less than in winter so the position shouldn't get much worse in the current financial year, but I do have serious concerns for our costs in 2024/25.

Quota payments are \pounds 539 over budget but we were owed \pounds 956 by the Diocese due to an overpayment last year so this is not a cause for concern. (I have subsequently received a refund from the Diocese.)

Like many, we face financial challenges, but our congregation has always risen to the challenge up until now. Thank you for your continued support.

NEW NET ZERO ECO GROUP AT HOLY CROSS

It is wonderful news that at the Vestry meeting last week it was agreed to set up a Net Zero Eco group at Holy Cross Church. This is another step on our path towards meeting the objectives of the Scottish Episcopal Church (SEC) Net Zero Toolkit. In the words of the Most Rev Mark Strange, Primus:

'The College of Bishops commends the Net Zero Toolkit to all the dioceses, charges, congregations, and individual members of the Scottish Episcopal Church, and asks us all to engage with the Toolkit without delay and begin to make real change now. It is offered as the first place to look for guidance on the actions they can take in their buildings and congregational life, now and over the years leading up to 2030.'

I have volunteered to be Convener of the group and this was kindly approved by Vestry. The Net Zero Eco Group will be responsible for the paperwork, administration, planning and reporting that is involved. We will act as Champions and Encouragers to help our Holy Cross Church community achieve the objectives set out in the Net Zero Toolkit. But it's all of us, working together, that will get the actions achieved – not the group. If you have a heart for the environment and the climate crisis and you're interested in joining the Net Zero Eco group, please get in touch with me.

The Net Zero Tool Kit covers ten categories (or 'Petals' in the SEC vocabulary) (see page 11). Each category has suggested associated actions and target objectives. Wonderfully, many actions are already covered! A big thank you to our church members who care for our gardens and grounds, as they already cover most of the suggested actions beautifully in the 'Thriving Biodiversity' category; and another thank you to Fr Stephen and Vestry members who've already put in a lot of work in the 'Energy Efficiency Improvements' category.


One of the tasks under the 'Build A Movement' category is to join Eco-Congregation Scotland, a Christian charity addressing climate change and conservation, that came out of the Church of Scotland in 2001. It has an established award scheme and Holy Cross is already close to being able to achieve a Bronze Award! The Vestry has approved us joining and aiming towards getting the Bronze Award.



KALENDAR and READINGS MAY 2024

Rogation Days are the three days before the Ascension & 25th April when there would traditionally be a procession to bless the fields and crops. Celebrated since the sixth century, they replaced a Roman procession to pray for agricultural protection. In the Anglican tradition Rogation Sunday is the Sixth Sunday of Easter.

Ember Days are three days of prayer and fasting in each of the four seasons of the year, this month in the week after Pentecost; like Rogation Days they originally involved prayer for crops and fields but as Ember Saturdays were often used for ordinations, they are now days of prayer for vocations.
