

FROM THE CURATE

November is a season of remembrance in the Church. The month begins with the feasts of All Saints and All Souls, during which we are invited to bring to mind all those who have died. This can be a poignant time as we remember those who we love but see no longer. It is also an opportunity for us to remember that in the Christian tradition, death is not the end. For through the resurrection of Jesus Christ we are all invited into the fullness of life. Later in the month is Remembrance Sunday, when we give thanks for those who made the ultimate sacrifice in the pursuit of peace. The month then ends with the feast of Christ the King, which marks the end of the liturgical year. This offers us an opportunity to cast our minds back over the previous year and to look forward to the year that begins with Advent. For Holy Cross, this means acknowledging that we find ourselves in a transitional period following the departure of Fr Stephen Holmes as our Rector. During this time we are invited to discern where God is calling us as a congregation and to pray for who God is calling to lead us into the next stage of our mission.

The act of remembrance also holds an important place in the sacramental life of the Church. For at the heart of the Eucharistic prayer is an act of recollection: 'Do this in memory of me'. Theologians use the term 'anamnesis' to describe the way in which we recall the saving work of Christ so that we might make ourselves present to the events of Golgotha and Gethsemane. As we say each week: 'We recall his blessed passion and death, his glorious resurrection and ascension; and we look for the coming of his Kingdom'. For it is by recalling the saving death of Christ and by proclaiming the good news of his resurrection that we are able to tell those around us that another world is not only possible but already breaking into our present. Now there is some good news to end the year on.

NEW RECTOR: WHAT'S HAPPENING?

What has been happening since 5th August, when Stephen and Izzy left Holy Cross? Actually quite a lot; your Vestry has been busy working away in the background. It doesn't seem long since our last vacancy period, however things have changed since then and we are keen to reflect this in preparing the information needed in our search for the person to lead us in the next part of our journey. It's not just a case of changing dates and names!

Over the course, hopefully, of the next month or so, we will publish:

- An updated *Profile* of our congregation, church, worship style, location, history, buildings, hopes and plans, etc., all of which, and more, will help those who may be considering applying to be our new Rector
- An updated Person Specification a summary of what we are looking for in a new Rector, including their worship and preaching style, pastoral care, theological position, and how they might support our hopes and expectations for Holy Cross, and where we see ourselves ten years from now. Our hopes for the future need to be incorporated.

Preparation of the above has already begun. Once the profiles have been completed and approved by the Bishop, we will draft an advert to be posted in *The Church Times* and other relevant outlets.

To help us build a picture of what the congregation wants and hopes for, we need your opinion on the above, and any other ideas you may have. We're not looking for long pieces - just a few words or sentences about what's important to you is enough - but we do want everyone to have the opportunity to give their views. Although we probably won't reply, all contributions will be read and their contents noted. Your input will also help when it comes to reviewing applications and (hopefully) shortlisting applicants, as well as in working out what questions to ask in interviews.

Remember, the vacancy is open to all - we need to be careful not to be discriminatory; fortunately there are others to check and make sure that we follow the rules.

Information on how to contribute is on page 5, and will be included in the Sunday sheets. It is important that your comments reach us <u>before</u> the **AGM (17th November).** The Vestry will meet the following week to begin finalising the various papers.

What else is happening? Decoration and internal work is planned for the Rectory - we hope the buildings committee, who will guide us on what needs to be done, will have visited by the end of November. The hedges have been cut and garden tidy-ups planned. And an arborist's report on the trees in the church grounds will have been completed; it's five years since our last written report, although Mervyn Loveridge has been keeping an eye on things and dealing with them as they arise.

Most of all, we need your prayers and encouragement as we work together over this period. Please do take advantage of the chance to have your voice heard, so that we can say truthfully that we are working together. It is not an easy time, but with Ross and Andrew to gently guide and help us, we will continue to grow and to be the warm, loving, God-filled space which we know and love. As Andrew said at a recent Vestry meeting, 'It's a lovely church, in a lovely place with a great congregation; who wouldn't want to be the Rector here?'. We need to make sure everyone hears that!

There has been much about love in our readings recently, which is just what we need! I hope that we can continue to love and support each other to grow and to reflect God's love in all that we do.

THANK YOU FROM ST SALVADOR'S COMMUNITY FOOD INITIATIVE

A word of thanks from everyone at St Salvador's Community Food Initiative for your gifts and donations this Harvest. We are currently assisting around 80 people each week. This is something that we simply could not do without your support. Your Harvest donations will enable us to continue supporting individuals and families in need within our local area. It is also a source of encouragement for our volunteer team to know that we are being supported by the gifts and prayers of others.

St Salvador's Community Food Initiative is a non-referral food pantry that

operates every Wednesday between midday and 1.30 p.m. When someone uses our service, they are greeted at the door and given a basics bag. This contains milk, tea, biscuits and toilet roll. They then have the option of selecting additional items from the fresh produce and dried goods that we have in stock.



We also operate a café space, where people are invited to stay for refreshments and conversation. The people we support come from a range of backgrounds and the service we offer helps ease some of the burdens that they are experiencing.

Items that are regularly requested include: rice, cereal, tuna, tinned meats, and nappies. You can also find information on how to financially support our Community Food Initiative on our website: stsalvadors.co.uk.

A big black box is near the entrance to the church awaiting your contributions.
