

Your dedication to 'The Holy Cross', as we recently remembered at our Patronal Festival, constantly reminds us of the One who longs to draw everyone to himself and who sends us into the world to share in that mission.

#### THE VACANCY - WHAT HAPPENS NEXT

Dear friends, yet again we find ourselves without a rector, so I thought it would be helpful to give a brief update about what is going on.

A number of us travelled to Perth on Sunday 15th September to see Stephen installed as Provost of St Ninians's Cathedral. It was a wonderful service with great music and a warm welcome for Stephen, Izzy and the girls.

Here at Holy Cross, the Vestry can now begin the process, alongside the Diocese, of preparing to appoint a new rector.

In the meantime, we are fortunate to still have Ross as our Curate, shared with St Salvador's. Ross will continue to look after us pastorally and he should be your first call if you need a priest.

Canon Andrew Bain has been appointed by the Bishop as our Interim Pastor, the role which Tim Tunley fulfilled before Stephen was appointed. Andrew will continue to take some services for us, but his main role is to accompany us through the vacancy process. We are very grateful, and fortunate to have the help of such an experienced priest.

The Vestry has already met with the Bishop and the Dean and reports now have to go to various committees including buildings and finance. There is work to be done on the Rectory for example and our accounts must be checked to ensure we can afford a rector!

We still have our parish and rector's profiles which were drawn up during our last vacancy and although these are no longer current, having a template should be very helpful. Last time it was all very new to us, so this time at least we have an idea what to expect.

Once we have the approval to go ahead, the process will involve:

- drawing up current profiles
- advertising the post
- interviewing and appointing.

Any priest who is appointed is likely to have to give three months notice to their present church, so as you can see it is not a quick process. There is an alternative route where, instead of advertising, the Bishop may have a suggestion for us if he knows of somebody looking for a move who he thinks would be a good fit. If this is the case, we would still interview but may not need to advertise. This decision will not be taken till further on in the process.

In the meantime, Ross is coordinating a list of clergy to lead our services, David is continuing to coordinate music and Jean Williams and I have both been licensed to lead Lay led services.

Please pray for all involved in the process and be aware that we are a small Vestry so will at times need to ask for others to help. If you can, please volunteer or say yes, so that we can do this together.



#### TREASURER'S REPORT

31st August marked the end of another financial year, and I am preparing the Annual Report and Accounts for the AGM on 17th November. This year I have been efficient and have already completed the first draft which I have passed, along with supporting paperwork, to our independent examiner, W Kenneth Ramage CA, to be audited. Kenneth is extremely discerning and invariably asks pertinent questions about my presentation of the reports, which lead to (hopefully minor) adjustments. After a bit of to-ing and fro-ing we reach an agreed position and Kenneth signs off the accounts. Kenneth also audits other churches' accounts and prepares the accounts for his own church, so his time is at a premium. This must all be done in time for us to circulate copies of the accounts to the congregation before the AGM. To complicate matters, Kenneth and I both have holidays planned in October, so it is all a bit hectic.

I am pleased to report that we are showing a small surplus for the year and our investments have increased in value so our reserves at the end of the financial year have increased. You will be able to see full details in the accounts presented for the AGM and I ask you to read them, hopefully make sense of them, appreciate the work that has gone into preparing them and ask any questions you have at the AGM.

This year, my focus on Holy Cross Day in September was distracted by Stephen's announcement of his resignation to take up his post at St Ninian's Cathedral, Perth, so we didn't hold our usual Annual Gift Day. If you would like to contribute, it is not too late. If you want to make an online donation, please put Gift Day in the reference. If you want to donate by cheque or cash, please put it in an envelope marked Gift Day and include your name so that I can claim back Gift Aid from HMRC. Gift Aid makes a huge difference, adding 25 per cent to each donation.

Thank you again for your donations. We rely on your generosity to keep the church solvent and to pay the stipend, pension contributions, council tax, quota, heating, lighting and cleaning bills etc., which arise from the continued running of our church.
