


For the Christingle service we also need:

VACANCY UPDATE

How are we doing?

Just a quick update as things are chugging along at a steady pace. The Vestry as a whole and in smaller groups has met to discuss and draw up the Parish and Rector profiles. We have paid attention to all comments received whether written, emailed or otherwise conveyed to us. Some have been included, others have been noted and will be taken on board as appropriate, e.g. when assessing applications or during the interview process. We hope to have the final profiles completed and submitted to the Bishop for his approval and the addition of his contribution before Christmas.

Once the profiles are complete we will draw up an advert which will hopefully be placed mid January with a closing date for applications of four to six weeks later – we have been advised not to place this over the Christmas period as many may miss it. The Bishop receives all of the applications and passes suitable ones to us for consideration and short listing after the closing date. Interviews will then be arranged, hopefully for March.

Things have also moved on with the Rectory. The painter has been doing some preliminary work, and work on the exterior of the kitchen is in hand. The Diocesan Buildings committee visited the Rectory this week and I am waiting for their report on what other work will be needed. We will certainly have to do some work on the kitchen to bring it up to standard and so we are getting a quote for this. In addition, the hedges have been cut and work will be done over the winter to improve the garden.

We're getting there! Thank you for all your support.

TREASURER'S REPORT

On Sunday 16th November the Annual Report and Accounts were presented to the congregation at the AGM and I'm pleased to report that they show that our financial position is sound. Our total reserves (the sum of our bank balance plus the value of our investments) increased from £105,366 to £116,113. We have a Vestry policy that we should hold reserves of at least £105,000, to cover one year's annual turnover of £75,000 plus a contingency fund of £30,000, and we are comfortably ahead of that.

The main reason for the improvement is an increase in the value of our investments, up £9,198 over the year after a fall of £1,077 in 2022/23. As is often said, the value of your investments can go down as well as up.

Congregational giving remained strong. Although it was less than in 2022/23,

that was because we received an exceptional donation that year, and it was 18% higher than in 2021/22. Hall rentals were dramatically lower than in the previous year, following the closure of our two main tenants, Oscar After School Club and the Reindeer Playgroup, but I am pleased to report that we have now recruited a replacement After School Club, Daddy Day Care, who started operating in August 2024.

Our income was also boosted by grants of £11,012 received during the year, mainly covering work that had been carried out and paid for in the previous year. Our expenditure on repairs and maintenance was down from £28,101 to £4,569, reflecting the fact that we had no major maintenance projects for the first time in many years.

I also presented our budget for 2024/25, forecasting a healthy surplus of £20,099 for the year. This is largely due to the savings on stipend, pensions contributions for the Rector following Revd Dr Stephen's departure to take up his new post at St Ninian's Cathedral, Perth. The Treasurer is perhaps alone in welcoming a vacancy which results in a saving of over £3,000 per month as long as it lasts. We will, however, have increased maintenance costs for refurbishment of the Rectory. We also anticipate increased rental income now that the Hall is returning to full occupancy.

It is important that we recognise that we are self-sufficient as a congregation. We raise sufficient income from congregational giving, Gift Aid and hall rental income to cover the cost of employing a full-time Rector and maintaining and heating our premises without relying on financial support from the Diocese and Province. This is something we should be proud of and is a testament to the generosity and work of a huge number of members of the congregation.

We face a period of waiting until we can appoint a new Rector but are fortunate to have Revd Dr Ross Jesmont as our Curate (shared with St Salvador's) and Revd Canon Andrew Bain as our Interim Pastor to help us along the way during the vacancy.

ST SAI VADOR'S COMMUNITY FOOD INITIATIVE

St Salvador's Community Food Initiative is a non-referral food pantry that operates every Wednesday between midday and 1.30 p.m. When someone uses our service, they are greeted at the door and given a basics bag. This contains milk, tea, biscuits

and toilet roll. They then have the option of selecting additional items from the fresh produce and dried goods that we have in stock

We also operate a café space, where people are invited to stay for refreshments and conversation. The people we support come from a range of backgrounds and the service we offer helps ease some of the burdens that they are experiencing.

Items that are regularly requested include: rice, cereal, tuna, tinned meats and nappies. You can also find information on how to financially support our Community Food Initiative on our website: stsalvadors.co.uk.

A big black box is near the entrance to the church awaiting your contributions. The basics are just as important at Christmas, but the odd treat would not come amiss. lust remember – if it's not in a tin, or dried in a packet, check use-by dates very carefully.

FRESH START COOKERS FOR CHRISTMAS APPEAL

Not everyone enjoys a merry Christmas. For those with little or no money, replacing or purchasing a cooker can be an unaffordable luxury. Fresh Start's Cookers for Christmas Campaign helps those in need by providing cookers and other essential white goods. You can make a difference this Christmas.

For two years, Becca was living in a small room in a hostel where privacy was a luxury. The hostel was a temporary shelter, but for Becca it felt like an endless chapter of her life. The hardest part was the lack of basic amenities – a cooker, a fridge, even a place to prepare a proper meal. She relied on ready-made food, eating mostly cold meals that provided little nourishment or comfort.

Becca had found herself homeless after a series of unfortunate events. A sudden job loss, followed by the breakdown of a relationship, had left her without a home. During this time, she became pregnant with her first child and more than ever needed somewhere she could feel safe, warm and call home.

One morning, Becca received the news she had been hoping for - a flat had become available and it was hers if she wanted it. She felt a mix of relief and excitement but also anxiety and fear. Moving into her own place was a dream come true, but the flat was bare, with no cooker, fridge or basic household essentials, and with little finances how would she turn it into a home for herself and her baby?

Thankfully Becca's support worker referred her to Fresh Start and we were able to help her turn her empty property into a home. Within the first week of her tenancy we delivered and fitted a cooker and a fridge-freezer along with a whole van load of essential Starter Pack items. Becca made a simple dinner – just pasta with a homemade sauce – but it tasted like a feast. With Fresh Start's help, Becca was able to move beyond mere survival.

After over 30 years of trading, it is with great sadness that we have to announce the time has come to close the Cornerstone Bookshop.



We are extremely grateful for all the support given to us by St John's from the shop's inception and are delighted to hear they are planning on opening a smaller bookshop within the church at some point next year.

But most of all, we would like to thank all of you, our customers, for your loyalty over the years. We have loved the conversations and good cheer and will miss you all.
